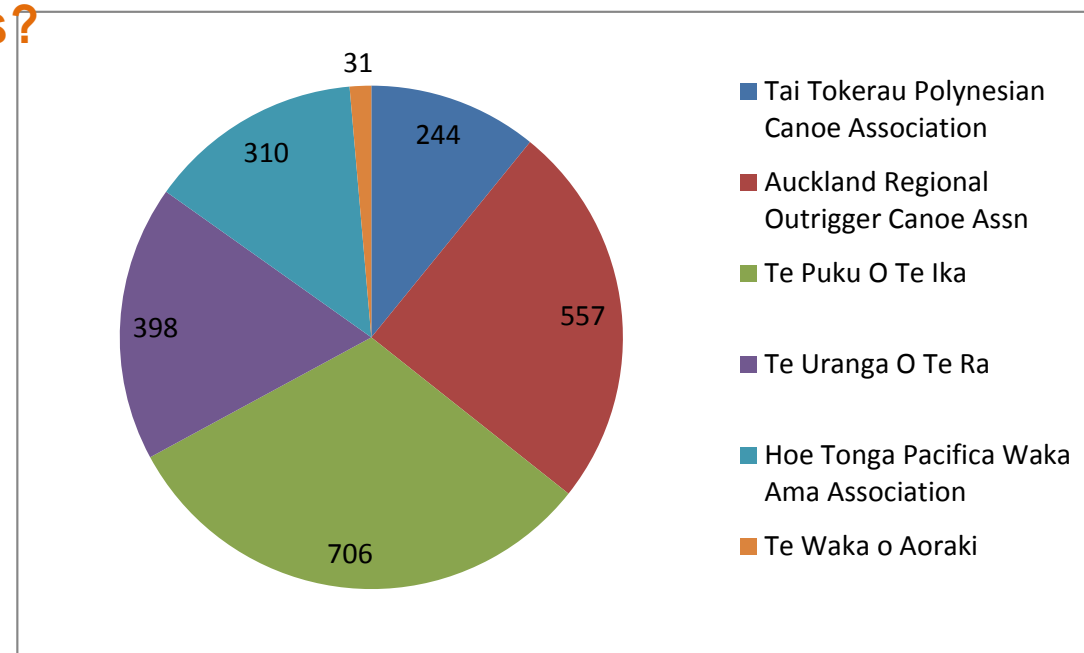


Figure 1: Regional Participation (Hoe Tonga) at National Sprints 2011
